

FATHER'S CORNER

Learning to enter into the Lord's Rest

Every morning all priests, nuns and consecrated persons around the world pray the liturgy of the hours, and the opening Psalm of every day is Psalm 95. In the last line of the Psalm the Lord gives quite the warning that the Church invites us to reflect on day after day, "Forty years I endured that generation. I said, "They are a people whose hearts go astray and they do not know my ways." So I swore in my anger, "They shall not enter into my rest." I have often meditated on the meaning of these words. They refer to the Israelites during their 40 years in the desert wandering, and God's greatest sorrow is that His people's hearts go astray, they choose their own ways, their own false gods to follow- because they refuse to listen to His voice and follow His ways. But the final word is what always remains with me, 'rest'. "They shall not enter into my rest."

College life can be quite busy (especially when your own priest suffers from an undue tendency towards hyperactivity)! And I must say that I've always been impressed with how hard the students at BSU work in not only their studies, but their spiritual life, community life and extracurricular activities... such as decorating the women's house with toilet paper and hotdogs in the cold of winter. They never cease to amaze me!



Needless to say, there is always a lot going on around St Paul's BSU, and for that I'm very proud. But I know that activity is accompanied by a serious warning from our Lord, "Don't let your heart go astray, don't follow your own ways, you will not enter into my rest." Being so 'busy', even for good things, can be the very hindrance to entering more fully into the fruitful ways of the Lord.

This may be the reason why this Advent, this new liturgical year, we're trying to refocus ourselves and in layman's terms, work smarter not harder. It's so important for us Catholics to learn to enter into the Lord's rest, so that we realize our true

worth comes not from what we do, but who we are. I know that begins with me, as the priest of St Paul's. In the midst of so many building projects and renovations around here, it's easy to forget that. It's easy to judge ourselves by how much we accomplish. (Although I must say I'm very impressed with the new work that has been done on our chapel, grotto, social hall, and library.... Come by and check it out if you haven't seen it yet!)

Advent is a time to 'turn back', to 'convert', to the One who is coming. Advent comes from the Latin words, 'ad venire' literally, 'turn towards the coming'. In this time, we are focusing on doing less so that we can become more in God. One way we are working on this is by observing the Lord's day with more intentionality. We moved the 5:00pm Sunday evening Mass to Saturday at 5:15pm. We recently heard an inspiring talk on how to regain the Lord's Day and a few key points were, 1. Have time of silence, 2. Vibrant, Holy Liturgy, 3. Intentional community life.

To help facilitate this, we are going to begin having some time for quiet prayer in the morning with adoration in the chapel before Mass, followed by an inspiring Liturgy with all the smells and bells (it's what we do!), and with our afternoons freed up we will be offering more opportunities for communal growth and relaxation together.

I want to thank you for staying involved and in touch with us at St Paul's BSU, and I invite you this Advent to consider how you yourself can more fully enter into the Lord's rest so we might all hear His Voice and follow His ways in our lives.




ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT
